## Surlingham Parish Council Annual General Meeting Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> April 2025 Report from CHSC

Thank you for your kind invitation to attend your AGM meeting representing Coldham Hall Sailing Club. (CHSC). (Report sent as same date as committee meeting).

This spring we have been busy professionally replacing a large section of our quay heading and removing the boardwalk which was in a poor state, we are very pleased with the result; we have refurbished our two waterside benches for all to use, we are planning to refurbish our clubhouse roof as well as installing additional canoe storage.

I am pleased to report our membership continues to thrive with sailing and increasing paddle membership; our sailing season started on Sunday (6th April) with a full events calendar through to December, including regattas, visiting sailing groups and socials. This year will be the 49th Yare Navigation Race, from Coldham to Breydon and back, inviting river cruisers to this prestigious race. We continue to offer our Try/Discover Sailing programme to introduce people to sailing. In 2024 we accredited 10 new members to sail our club owned boats.

Our canoe/kayak/paddleboard section will undertake a 'Paddle Clean-up of the river' an ambitious Rockland to Surlingham Ferry, maybe beyond. (UK Paddle, River Clean-Up campaign).

Social paddle Tuesdays invites anyone to come along who will be supported throughout followed by a social debrief after at the Ferry. Last year we regularly had up to 22 paddlers from May to September; other events are planned including CPR/Defibrillator/First Aid awareness with NARS, Norfolk Ambulance Rescue Service. We hope to raise funds to replace the existing Defib metal cabinet for a polycarbonate cabinet outside the Tavern.

We are in contact with the East Anglian Air Ambulance (EAAA) offering Support with their Trek24 in May which passes our clubhouse along the Wherrymans Way and return.

We work closely with the RSPB and Broads Authority to enhance 'The River Yare'.

We advise people not to venture close to the river bank, to keep away from the quay heading and pontoons and to wear a buoyancy aid and suitable clothing on and near the river. We do not allow any swimming or diving at Coldham Hall Sailing Club which we hope the Parish Council will continue to support.

## Life Jackets & Buoyancy Aids for all craft

Yes, we've covered this subject before, we like to help and ensure you are looking after yourselves and others. How many out there rely on the self inflating life jackets with no yearly, or longer, check? For your own safety and peace of mind it's timely to check them over at least yearly, as well as checking on your current buoyancy method, please take a moment to have a read; this is for sailing and paddling.

#### Lifejackets, produced by the RNLI https://rnli.org/safety/lifejackets

Choosing the right lifejacket or buoyancy aid for your activity can be difficult. With many different options to choose from and technical language that can be confusing, you might end up using something unsuitable, or worse, not using one at all.

A personal flotation device (PFD) is something you wear that will keep you afloat should you enter the water. There are a number of different types, but the most common are buoyancy aids and, in particular, lifejackets.

Choosing the right lifejacket for the type of activity you are doing on the water can be the difference between life and death. Choosing the wrong type of lifejacket can leave you frustrated and unable to fully enjoy the activity you're doing, increasing the temptation to remove it completely.



In this guide, we'll talk you through the different types of PFD available and what activity they are suited to. We also have some information on how to check and maintain your lifejacket, so that if you do have to use it, it will work exactly as it should.

#### Why should you wear a lifejacket?

Every year, around 200 people drown in the coastal waters around the UK and Ireland. These tragedies happen to people taking part in a wide range of water-based and waterside activities. Research has proven that wearing a lifejacket can increase your chances of survival by up to four times if you're immersed in cold water.\* Whatever your activity, wearing a well-fitted, well-maintained and suitable lifejacket or buoyancy aid could save your life.

#### Best option – don't fall in!

If you fall over the side and are not attached to your boat/craft, you can rapidly become separated from the vessel. This will greatly increase the difficulty of rescue, so may decrease chances of survival.

Staying on, or near, your boat is always going to be the best option. At the very least, make a policy of clipping on to suitable points around the boat at night, when alone on deck, or in rough conditions. Ensure you have a harness line with a hook at both ends. Clipping on is particularly important on sailing boats, where the motion and angle of heel can be unpredictable. Whenever possible, use a lanyard that is sufficiently short to prevent you from falling over the side. If someone falls overboard while attached to a safety lanyard, stop the boat immediately – being dragged through the water alongside a vessel can be life threatening.

#### Motorboats including club safety boat

The driver must attach himself to the safety cord commonly known as the 'kill cord' this is attached to a switch when detached stops the engine, if the driver leaves the safety boat a second cord is on the boat, when someone is in the


water do not restart the engine/ propeller until safe to do so. Ideally rescue the person from the water first. Passengers should always sit down.

**Cold water shock** Cold water shock is the uncontrollable reaction of the body when it is first submerged in cold water (15°C or lower). In initial submersion, the body will experience a gasp reflex, which is a rapid intake of air. This is followed by a fourfold increase in breathing rate and associated increases in heart rate and blood pressure, making some people susceptible to heart attacks. These symptoms will last up to 3–5 minutes during which even the fittest person is unable to swim or to focus on breathing. Wearing a lifejacket with the correct buoyancy is vital to survival.

During the initial stages of cold water shock, try to stay calm and let your lifejacket keep you afloat. The clothing you are wearing, the fitting and features of your lifejacket and the amount of energy you expend will all be critical factors to survival from this point onwards.

Without a lifejacket even the most competent swimmer will suffer from 'swim failure' after around 30 minutes of swimming in cold water. If you are wearing a well-fitting lifejacket with crotch straps, there is no need to swim and you can concentrate on keeping warm, conserving energy and making yourself visible.

If you are on your own, cross your ankles, put your knees together and bring your arms around your body and float in the Heat Escape Lessening Position (HELP).

## Season Start Sundy 6th April 2025

The first local race day of the year was held on Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> April. After months of cleaning painting and repairing seven Yeomans and one club Wayfarer came to the line in glorious early morning sunshine with Officer's of the Day, David and Margaret Woolston and Dave Durrant, setting a two buoy course.

Although the Easterly had a bit of a chill to it the racing got off to a great start with competitors enjoying a moderate breeze which increased slightly as the day progressed.

David & Will Taitt in Yeoman *Trio* took line honours in the first race followed closely by Kim Mayfield and Carol in Yeoman *Tara* in second with John & Sandy Wells in a newly liveried *Diamond Lil* coming in third.



After tea/coffee the second race started on the same two mark course and in slightly stronger wind conditions but still with bright sunshine.
